Rainbow Harvest – Wednesday 19th October 2022 at 1.30pm

We are holding our Harvest Service at St Mary's Church Chilton Foliat on Wednesday 19th October at 1.30pm. **All are welcome**. Songs, prayers and readings will be shared to celebrate the wonder of autumn, one of God's amazing creations.

We are all aware of the increased cost of living pressures that affect so many in our society. The children are keen to show their understanding of the value of the wonderful produce that has been grown, harvested or created from the land.



At this time of year we ask for donations to be made for the Food Bank organised by the Trussel Trust. This year we would like to do the same but with a little rainbow twist.

As you know, in recent years, the rainbow has been a symbol of hope and thanks to those working on the frontline during the pandemic. We are extending this appreciation into our harvest of thankfulness for what we have, and the generosity and hope we can offer to others.

Each year group is being allocated a colour from the rainbow and asked to bring an item of food with that colour in it or on it. We are inviting food stuff donations which can be non-perishable and of the fresh fruit and vegetable variety. The colour could come from part of the coloured packaging or the colour of the product or the colour of the bare fruit or vegetable. The outcome will be to create our own harvest rainbow from all the children's offerings in the church ready for our Harvest Service.

All tinned and packaged foods will be donated to the Food Bank. All fresh fruit and vegetables will be sold off after the church service and the profits going to purchase more for the Food Bank.

Non-perishable donations can be brought to school from **10th October** and any fresh fruit or vegetable donations can be brought on the day of the Harvest Service itself.

Trips and events – payment plans

As this newsletter has already mentioned we are aware of the increased financial pressures many of our families are currently facing. At the same time, we are also extremely keen to continue to offer our children extra-curricular activities such as trips out and visitors in.

These opportunities come at a cost and we would like to offer all our families the opportunity to set up a pre-payment plan in advance of these events taking place. We will be writing to individual classes with an idea of the trip plans and approximate costs, so that everybody has an idea of what to budget for and to begin to pay in smaller regular amounts if they would like to.

Reading Awards

With Celebration Assembly back in full swing, we are beginning to award Reading Certificates in recognition of the effort made by both children and adults to read at home. There are many ways you can help your children with their learning and reading is the single most important. A child's reading skills are important to their success in school as it will allow them to access the breadth of the curriculum and improve their communication and language skills. In addition, reading can be a fun and imaginative time for children ,opening doors to all kinds of new worlds for them.

The system for collecting information about the number of times you have read with your child (or practised their phonic letters and sounds in relation to reading) at home is as follows:

- Every child has their own reading record or reading log
- Every time you read with your child at home, make a note in your children's reading record; letter sounds practiced, number of pages read
- Reading records get handed into the class teacher or class teaching assistant at some point during the week and the number of reads at home are counted up.

Reading Rewards and Certificates are awarded for the following:

Number of reads at home	Award or certificate
30 reads	Peacock Bookmark
70 reads	Bronze Certificate
120 reads	Silver Certificate
180 reads	Gold Certificate
200 reads	Gold Reading Medal
250 reads	Book of choice
320 reads	Emerald Bookmark
400 reads	Ruby Bookmark
500 reads	Book of choice and reading medal

When a reading threshold has been reached and an award or certificate prepared to hand out at Celebration Assembly, parents and carers will be notified by the office.

Attendance

Absence that cannot be authorised

Our attendance figures for the beginning of this academic are at 95%. We are also, receiving less requests for absences which cannot be authorised. This is good news and we are grateful for all your support and forward planning.

We do know that absence has a well evidenced negative impact on learning and achievement, and this is something, as a whole school community, we work towards avoiding. For those children whose unauthorised attendance meets a certain threshold, the rules are clear. In the event of 10 or more sessions of unauthorised absence, a penalty notice will be issued. Attendance in the event of illness

Conversely, we are experiencing a surge of absence due to ill health across the school with a variety of illnesses impacting our children and staff. Covid is still around and in school we continue to practice those all important preventative measures, beginning with handwashing, good ventilation and in-class hygiene. We also have children off with other bugs which are more common for this time of year. If you child has experienced either sickness or diarrhea, please keep them at home for the required 48 hours. If your child is off with a raised temperature they must have 24 hours clear with no medication to control the temperature before returning to school. Many thanks for your support.
